# National Student Clearinghouse

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- Provides the national source of education verification and student outcomes research for over 25 years.
- National Student Clearinghouse provides data about post-secondary enrollment and graduation from 3,600 colleges and universities.



# National Student Clearinghouse


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## The Data Resources:

- NSC works with over 11,000 high schools representing nearly 60% of high school students.
- 97%, or 19.5 million, of currently enrolled postsecondary students (99% of all public and private institutions) are part of the database.
- Over 94% of all degrees awarded in the U.S. are tracked.




# Percent of 2018 Graduates Enrolled in Fall Immediately After Graduation



AVG = 40%




# Percent of 2018 Graduates Enrolled Anytime in the First Year After Graduation

# Percent of 2017 Graduates Enrolled Anytime in the Two Years After Graduation





# Next Steps

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- Expect and support all students toward the goal of post-secondary readiness throughout their K-12 education.
- Succeed in the implementation of Ambitious Instruction 2.0 with fidelity to increase student achievement.
  - Ensure tier 1 instruction targets are met in early childhood education through grade 12.
- Continue relationships with post-secondary institutions and increase opportunities for students to engage in dual enrollment opportunities.
  - M<sup>3</sup> Early College, transcribed credits, Early College Credit Program/Start College Now
- Improve access and expect students to take rigorous course work during high school.



# Next Steps

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- Share the National Student Clearinghouse data with a wider range of stakeholders (e.g. all high school teachers).
- Increase the number of Academic Career Planning activities for students.
  - Ninth grade visits to University of Wisconsin Milwaukee
  - Tenth grade visits to Milwaukee Area Technical College
  - Job Fair for students age 16 and older
  - Career Fair for students in grades 6-8
  - Career exploration through work-based learning experiences (e.g., youth apprenticeships, internships, job shadowing)
- Continue efforts to engage seniors in the completion of FAFSA, post-secondary applications, awareness of postsecondary options (e.g. Historically Black Colleges and University tours) and scholarship applications.
