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Schools

The Milwaukee Public Schools budget is organized into four sections: Budget-in-Brief; Organizational; Financial, including Schools, Central Services and Line Items; and Informational, including City Profile, MPS Profile and Glossary. The Schools subsection is contained within the Financial section.

The Schools subsection of the 2017–18 Superintendent's Proposed Budget describes various types of schools, school programs, centrally supported programs and staffing, student enrollment and its relationship to school funding and detailed information for each school.

School Budget Background

The school allocation and budget development process was challenging entering into 2017–18. While district enrollment has stabilized after years of decline, projected revenues are essentially flat for the School Operations Fund. Inflationary pressures, particularly in the area of employee benefits, cause schools to lose buying power within their allocated funds. Before school allocations were developed in the spring, the superintendent, chief school administration officer and senior director of financial planning and budget services held budget carousels with every school at which school leaders, the school support teacher, parent coordinator and regional superintendent discussed school progress, school challenges and resource needs. With a decrease in the per pupil amount for all school levels, difficult decisions were made on the part of school communities and will require schools to focus on a small set of achievable goals that can be pursued immediately.

Types of Schools

School-age children living in Milwaukee may attend the following types of MPS schools:

Milwaukee Public Schools

- Neighborhood schools (also called attendance area schools) give priority for acceptance to children from the neighborhood to enroll before the school accepts children from other neighborhoods. These schools will accept children from other areas of the region if seats are available.
- **Comprehensive middle and high schools** offer a wide variety of academic, extracurricular programming and student supports to serve their diverse student populations. These schools have attendance areas and encourage those students living within the attendance area to enroll but will also accept students who live outside of those areas who are interested in the particular offerings at the school.
- Neighborhood specialty schools offer special programs or areas of study, such as the arts or technology. These schools encourage neighborhood students to enroll but also accept students citywide if seats are available.
- **Citywide specialty schools** accept children from across the city and outside of the city through open enrollment/Chapter 220. These schools offer special programs or areas of study including arts, International Baccalaureate, Montessori and language immersion.
- **Instrumentality charter schools** are administered and staffed by MPS but operate more independently than other schools within the MPS family and use their own enrollment process.

Programs available in MPS schools

Academic programs are designed to meet a broad range of student needs, from early preschool to high school classes for college credit. Programs include:

- Achievement Gap Reduction (AGR) offers specialized support for students in five-year-old kindergarten (K5) through third grade
- Advanced Placement (AP) allows high school students to earn college credit by taking college-level courses at their school and passing a cumulative exam
- Arts/Music Specialty Schools and Programs offer visual and performing arts and music instruction including band, orchestra or choir. There are four MPS schools (King Jr., Lancaster, Sherman and Roosevelt) that participate in the Turnaround Arts program which provides arts access to students and uses an integrated arts model to boost student achievement



Career and Technical Education (CTE) prepares students for college and careers in high-demand, high-skill industries. Offerings include agriculture, business, construction/architecture, culinary arts, engineering, finance, health science, hospitality/tourism, information technology, manufacturing, marketing, media/graphic design and transportation

Community Schools are governed through a system that includes students, staff, families, partners and residents which allows all voices to be heard and encourage greater involvement by families and greater engagement from the community

- Early Childhood Education programs include half-day and full-day Head Start for three-year-old students, full day Head Start for four-year-olds and three- and four-year-old kindergarten (K3 and K4)
- First Nation Studies allows American Indian students to received native language revitalization classes and academic advisors
- **GE Schools** are select MPS schools that have been developed as models for putting students on track to college and career readiness through support of the GE Foundation
- **Gifted & Talented** programs offer gifted and talented specialty programming for academically advanced children
- Homeless Education Program provides a coordinator at each MPS school to assist children and families who are homeless pursuant to the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act
- International Baccalaureate (IB) helps students in all grades develop the intellectual, personal, emotional and social skills to live, learn and work in a rapidly globalizing world. At the high school level IB offers rigorous college preparatory classes that can be taken for college credit
- International Newcomer Center provides newly arrived immigrant and refugee students in fifth through eighth grade with intensive language development and cultural support at Milwaukee Academy of Chinese Language for high school students at South Division

- Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) is offered at select high schools and promotes character education, student achievement, wellness, leadership and diversity
- Language Specialty Programs
 - Developmental bilingual programs support native speakers of Spanish in building Spanish language skills while also mastering English
 - Dual Language programs teach both English and Spanish to all students in the program
 - English as Second Language (ESL) are for students whose first language is not English and are learning English
 - Language Immersion programs are offered in French, German, Italian and Spanish and students learn core subjects in the target language to develop early proficiency in the second language



- **Montessori** schools offer a method of instruction that fosters independence and problem solving skills through an individualized, self-directed classroom structure
- **Project Lead the Way (PLTW)** is a rigorous, nationally recognized program that connects students to science, technology, engineering and math

Other types of MPS schools/programs

- MPS non-instrumentality charter schools are contracted with MPS but do not employ MPS staff, are operated by independent organizations and operate in their own facilities or lease from MPS. These schools offer a variety of academic programs.
- **Partnership schools** are operated by external agencies that contract with MPS under the provisions of the Wisconsin Children At-Risk Act, Wis. Stat. § 118.153. They provide services as follows:
 - At-risk programs provide alternative school options to students considered at risk of not completing high school. The student must meet the statutory definition of a child at risk.
 - Behavioral reassignment programs in partnership schools were established to provide education and services for students who are removed from traditional MPS schools for behavioral problems. The students are usually assigned for one semester or more to schools with behavioral reassignment seats.
- Other partnership and supplemental programs include the following:
 - **Contracted special education programs** are partnerships with various community agencies that provide services to EBD students (students with severe emotional behavioral disabilities).
 - Adjudicated youth programs are cooperative efforts between MPS and either the Milwaukee County Department of Human Services or the juvenile correctional system. These programs provide educational services to students who have been court-ordered to attend school.
- MPS alternative schools for at-risk students include various programs for alternative education for MPS students.

- Groppi and Project STAY enroll students considered at risk of not graduating from high school and provide a smaller learning environment and support services to improve academic achievement.
- Transition High School offers students the chance to have a personalized educational plan designed to develop personal growth and structured around virtual learning, employment or community service. Transition offers programs for youth transitioning from incarceration to a district school setting.
- Now in the MPS portfolio in 2017–18 is South Acceleration and Vincent Acceleration. These new small alternative high schools will serve 100 students at South and Vincent respectively. Students must have completed one full academic year at the high school level, be at or below 70 percent attendance, be considered at risk for credit attainment, meet one additional risk indicator and have parent consent. These schools will utilize the competency-based curriculum to support students in accruing credits, with additional supports including mentoring and community circles (restorative practices).
- Milwaukee County Collaborative includes the Milwaukee County Youth Education Center and is a partnership between the board and Milwaukee County to meet state law requirements concerning incarcerated school-age youth. The program provides education for inmates between the ages of 12 and 18 (up to age 21 if in special education). Upon enrollment, each student inmate's educational history and skill levels are assessed, and they receive math, reading and language instruction specifically tailored to their needs.
- Pregnant and Parenting Youth services are available to school-age parents (young fathers and mothers) to improve the educational, wellness and social/emotional outcomes for school-age parents and their children. The goals of the program are to increase attendance and graduation rates, increase teen enrollment in higher education, increase parent knowledge of effective parenting practices, increase knowledge about and practices in healthy relationships and enhance coordination of school and community services.
- Home and Hospital provides educational services to students who are confined to their homes or hospital settings for extended periods of time due to serious medical or psychological conditions.
- School-to-Work Transition offers a continuum of services to students with special needs with three separate but highly related programs to prepare them for the world of work (Community Assessment Training Program, On-the-Job Training/Education and the Employment Training Program). Students can receive vocational assessments to determine



vocational interests and readiness for competitive employment. Students receive on-the-job training to refine work skills and aptitudes needed for successful employment. Beginning in the 2017–18 school year, all traditional middle and high schools will be moved to an "early start" calendar,

beginning three weeks before the traditional school year and ending three weeks before the end of the traditional school year. The early start allows students more instructional time prior to testing windows and a clean semester break in which final exams are taken before the winter break.

A new J-Term is a non-compulsory instruction and enrichment opportunity following the end of the school year and prior to Summer Academy that offers credit recovery, academic acceleration opportunities, art, music and technology enrichment, internship and career based learning, and mentorship and restorative practices.

School Accounts Allocation Methodology - School Operations Fund

Each year the district determines how much of the School Operations Fund can be distributed to the schools and how much is to be "set aside" in central accounts. Chart 3.48 shows which funds are set aside for 2017–18 and the amount that has been allocated to schools in the School Operations Fund.

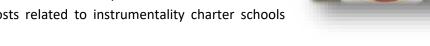

After overall school revenues of \$697.8 million are determined, allocations of \$365.4 million for centralized school programs (art, music, physical education, library, guidance, specialized services, school office staff, etc.) and \$72.2 million for non-traditional school types (partnerships, non-instrumentality charter schools, etc.) are deducted. The remaining revenues of \$260.2 million are allocated directly to traditional schools, instrumentality charter schools and alternative schools.

The first step in allocating this \$260.2 million in revenue is to distribute site allocations. Site allocations are items that are not easily distributed on a per-pupil basis and are specific to a school due to staffing or other unique requirements. Site allocations include the following:

- Schools with Culinary Arts and Turnaround Arts programs are allocated 1.0 FTE of a teacher
- Schools with an enrollment of less than 350 are allocated 0.5 FTE of a teacher to offset the higher costs of • staffing a small school
- High schools with an alternative education program are allocated 1.0 FTE of a teacher to staff the GEDO #2 and competency based alternative programs
- English as a second language (ESL) school-based classroom staff are allocated based on a weighted formula that takes into account the proficiency level of enrolled English learners and number of refugee students
- Specialty schools such as art schools, IB schools, gifted and talented, career and technical education and STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) and Milwaukee School of Languages receive 1.0 FTE teacher and \$150 per student
- All other specialty schools receive 2.25 FTE paraprofessionals and \$150 per student (Montessori, language immersion and dual language)
- Transportation support for instrumentality charter schools
- Allocation for audit costs related to instrumentality charter schools totaling \$53,700

Weighted Student Funding

The second step in allocating the remainder of the school-based allocations is to distribute funds on a per-student basis. In the spring, the per-pupil count used in this calculation is the projected full-time equivalent (FTE). Separate per-pupil amounts are calculated for each school level – high, middle, K–8 and elementary. The per-student dollar amount is multiplied by each school's projected pupil FTE figure to arrive at an allocation for each category. The per-pupil amount does not change when schools adjust their budget in the fall based on Third Friday enrollment, but the per-pupil is multiplied by the actual Third Friday enrollment. Per-pupil amounts for 2017–18 were derived using historical cost data for each type of school.

The diminished resources in this budget cycle required that the pupil amount allocated for each student to schools be reduced. School-by-school modeling was completed by the Department of Financial Planning & Budget Services to ensure that the 2017–18 allocation and per-pupil amount would provide for classroom staffing to maintain a reasonable class size and a modest non-position budget.

Centralizing school costs reduces the per-pupil allocation for each school and changes the school level per-pupil weight factors.

Chart 3.49 shows the weighted student allocation amounts for 2017–18 compared to 2016–17.

Weighted student funding helps the district to improve:

- Equity: Students are funded equitably regardless of which school they attend.
- School Empowerment: Schools have both the autonomy and the responsibility to design their schools to best meet their student needs.
- **Innovation**: Principals have the freedom to organize their school in whatever way they believe will best serve their students.
- Accountability: Every school controls its own budget and school leaders are responsible for resource decisions and related outcomes.
- **Transparency**: A weighted student formula in both school-based and central allocations makes it clear to all relevant stakeholders how much money schools receive and how the allocation process works.

Other Weighting Factors

- Due to financial constraints on the district in the case of three-year-olds, three-year-olds with special education needs and other three-year olds (including Montessori students) are included for state funding purposes at a weight of 0.5 per pupil.
- The Head Start grant covers the cost of one teacher and one aide for every three-year-old Head Start classroom and half the cost of a teacher and aide for four-year-old Head Start classrooms. Schools do not receive a per-pupil allocation for three-year old Head Start students.

Efforts were made in this budget cycle to ensure equitable allocations among comparable schools. A transparent and consistent set of decision making criteria were applied to all schools equally. Central allocations, such as Art, Music and PE allocations and school counselor allocations were examined to ensure schools of similar size and type were allocated the same resources, and the differences between school sizes, program and student needs were evaluated and supported with limited available resources.

Individual School Budget Development

The development of a school budget is a critical component of the district-wide process. A school's budget is driven by allocation formulas, district-wide policies and procedures, school-based initiatives and school support needs.

The budget process starts with the administration, school leaders and their School Governance Councils reviewing prior years' enrollments for patterns and identifying proposed program changes that will affect school enrollments. Other factors considered when predicting enrollment are the number of school-aged children from the census data and the competition of other Milwaukee options for education. The enrollment projections are

determined using demographic data and enrollment trends to develop grade-by-grade pupil projections for MPS elementary, K–8, middle and high schools. Finance staff produces instructional and reference materials, including allocation amounts. For additional support, due to the difficult budget realities in the 2017–18 budget every school leader met with their budget analyst individually to prepare their budgets.

During the winter, school and department budget carousels are held with each school leader and department head. These budget carousel meetings - hosted by the Superintendent, Office of Finance and Office of School Administration and identified progress, challenges, current school capacity to address the challenges identified, and school and department resource needs. All traditional, alternative and instrumentality charter schools participate in the budget carousels. Participants include the school leader, school support teacher and parent coordinator from each school.



From these discussions, feedback and community surveys, recommendations for infrastructure changes and the need to repurpose existing resources, roles and activities emerge to inform decisions at Central Services associated with technical assistance and centralized support to schools.

This winter, separate school facility carousel meetings were held in February and March 2017. The facility carousel meetings - hosted by the Chief Operating Officer, Office of Finance, Office of School Administration and the Office of Chief of Staff - addressed communication and collaboration on facility matters, adequacy of school facilities for instruction programming and priorities for facility repairs and improvements. The participants included the school leader, building engineer and parent coordinator from each school.

Review Process

School administrators reviewed the budget and worked with their School Governance Council (SGC) in making decisions regarding staffing and resource allocation for the following year. The school leader and SGC approved the budget before it was returned to the Department of Financial Planning & Budget Services. This department, along with the Offices of School Administration and Academics, ensure that the budget resources support sound instructional plans. The budget is then reviewed and approved by the superintendent of schools.

Fall Budget and Staffing Adjustment Process

In the fall, schools again work with the department of Financial Planning & Budget Services staff to adjust school budgets resulting from the difference between projected enrollment and actual enrollment, and for any other developments not known in spring. The enrollment at a school on the third Friday of September is used to determine a school's final allocation amount. Fall adjustments can present challenges for schools with large enrollment differences. In order to maintain consistency in staff and programming at the school, adjustments are carefully reviewed by staff in the Department of Financial Planning & Budget Services, the Office of School Administration and the Office of Academics.

Basic Funding for Traditional and Instrumentality Charter Schools

Total enrollment for 2017–18 is projected to be 76,534 for all MPS school types. Funding for traditional, instrumentality charter and alternative schools in 2017–18 is \$260.2 million based on projected September 2017 enrollment of 68,390 students for these school types. Centralized services and staff for schools include \$365.4 million for a total of \$625.6 million supporting traditional, instrumentality charter and alternative schools. This is a decrease of \$21.9 million from the 2016–17 school year.

There are multiple school costs that are budgeted centrally. Centralization of these costs improves the overall standard of care for students by budgeting for these costs consistently, efficiently and equitably. Centralization allows school leaders time to focus on instruction, decreases their time spent on administrative issues and decreases the likelihood that individual schools will incur costs which are beyond their control. More detail on these allocations are described on the following pages.



Centralized school costs include the following:

- Costs associated with special education in a school
- At least a 0.6 FTE teacher to budget for art, music and physical education as best meets the needs of the school, plus a 0.2 FTE librarian teacher at every school with seventh grade and above; an allocation of \$10 per pupil is included in every school's art, music and physical education (AMP) allocation to purchase supplies
- Substitute teacher costs for teacher absences reported in the substitute teacher system (professional development not included)
- Salaries for all safety aides assigned to schools
- Building services and educational maintenance costs, except for repairs resulting from internal vandalism
- Armored car services
- A minimum of 0.2 FTE of school counselor time for every school; schools have the option of purchasing additional time for school counselors through the optional services process
- School leader and secretarial positions
- Assistant principal positions, which were allocated based on school type and size
- School bookkeepers

While Title I is a federal grant and separate from the School Operations Fund, it is an important component in a school's budget. Adding to the challenges schools faced in preparing their budgets was the reduction in the Title I per-pupil amount due to the change in the federal funding formula in the new Every Student Succeeds Act. Title I allocations for each school are determined through a formula that takes into account the previous year's Third Friday enrollment of 5- to 17-year-old students whose families live in poverty. Each year, a per-pupil amount for schools with 100 percent of students living in poverty is calculated based on the funding available for allocation to schools. For 2017–18, this per-pupil amount is \$400, down from \$440 in 2016–17. A unique per pupil for each school is calculated by multiplying the \$400 per-pupil amount by the percentage of student living in poverty at each school. To arrive at the total allocation, the prorated per-pupil is then multiplied by the number of students living in poverty.

Each school has latitude to budget the basic per pupil Title I allocation within federal guidelines. In addition, Title I funding has been allocated so that every school will have a 1.0 FTE school support teacher (SST) and a 0.75 FTE parent coordinator. Schools with a projected Title I enrollment of 800 or greater, or K-12 schools, were allocated 1.0 FTE parent coordinator and an additional 0.5 FTE to fill the role of a partial release school support teacher. This teacher would also be partially budgeted in other funds and would spend 50 percent of the time in the classroom and 50 percent of the time in the role of a school support teacher.

The parent coordinator engages in activities that build the parents' capacity to help their child succeed and works to develop strong parental connections to the school. The school support teacher serves under the direction of the school's principal and the Office of Academics to support the *Framework for Teaching* at the school and classroom levels. The teacher has several responsibility areas at the school level: instructional coaching, assessment coordination, use of data to inform instruction to improve student outcomes, implementation of educator effectiveness, facilitating peer observation, and planning and providing professional development based on teacher or school site needs.

Centralized School Programs and Supplements



Central Art, Music, Physical Education (AMP) Teachers

The 2017–18 AMP budget supports 234.5 FTEs, a decrease of 16.2 FTEs from the 2015– 16 budget. Funding of \$23.2 million in board funds reinforces the district's priority of a standard of care through investment in art, music, physical education (PE) and library services. Every school must budget a minimum 0.2 FTE each for art, music and physical education. Schools with grades 7–12 must also staff a minimum of 0.2 FTE librarian. Schools often choose to budget an additional amount for art, music, physical education and librarian staff in their board budgets. Schools may reallocate AMP funds to support

contracts with approved vendors in the Milwaukee community through the "Fill the Gaps" initiative if they have historically had troubles filling the positions. The initiative allows schools to provide access for all students to the arts even if there is no licensed teacher to fill the position, and gives the opportunity for schools to begin programming on the first day of the school year. In the spring budget process, 31 schools opted to contract with community vendors.

Central School Counselor Positions

Centrally budgeted there is \$8.6 million in board funds for 91.4 FTE school counselor positions to ensure that state counselor service requirements are met. Another \$756,858 in federal funds will support 8.7 FTEs for elementary schools. Every traditional and instrumentality charter school will have school counseling services in 2017–18. Schools can choose to use part of their allocated board funds to increase their overall school counselor time through the optional services purchasing process. In K–8 schools, a school counselor will spend at least one day per week in the school. Pursuant to administrative procedure, the amount of time the school counselor spends in a middle or high school is determined by the enrollment of each individual school.

Central School Office Staff

In 2017–18, \$47.1 million is set aside to cover the cost of school leaders, assistant principals and secretaries. In order to continue on the path to build a stronger standard of care, an allocation formula determines centrally funded principals and school secretaries. This funding strategy is used to ensure that all schools would have the leadership and support needed to grow student achievement. In 2015–16, assistant principal costs were also moved to the central school office staff budget. Schools are allocated assistant principal positions based on school type and size. The Office of School Administration assigns a small number of assistant principals based on special circumstances of a school.

Supplemental School Support

This fund supports \$3.1 million for various critical staffing needs that are not able to be met in individual 2017–18 school budgets. When school leaders submitted their budgets in the spring, they could also submit a "Critical Staffing Needs" request application if there were critical needs not met by the basic school allocation. Applications are reviewed by the administration and ultimately approved by the superintendent.

As fall enrollment is finalized, Finance and School Administration work with schools, particularly those which are adversely impacted by lower-than-projected enrollment. Where necessary, central funds are set aside to be certain that student needs could be met at each school. A small reserve is maintained to support mid-year school resource needs due to changing enrollment.

The Milwaukee Board of School Directors approved a district-wide uniform policy that will be in effect for the 2017—18 school year. With the focus of improving student achievement, research indicates that school uniforms can contribute to a positive school environment. Schools can opt out the policy if 66 percent of the school community votes to do so. An amount of \$20 per student has been set aside to support schools with implementation of this new policy.

Education Maintenance

There is \$1.9 million set aside both at schools and centrally to assist schools with identified costs related to a variety of building and building equipment repair, remodeling and maintenance activities. These activities represent aesthetic or educational program choices. Examples include repair of offices or audio-visual equipment, furniture and interior painting.

School Office Support (Bookkeepers)

The centralized school office support account allocates \$2.3 million (33 bookkeepers) to provide 128 traditional and instrumentality charter schools with school bookkeeping services and support in cash handling, bank reconciliations and procurement processing.

Achievement Gap Reduction

The SAGE program was transitioned by state law in 2016–17 to become the Achievement Gap Reduction (AGR) program. The AGR program provides supplemental funding support for K5 through grade three in schools previously receiving SAGE program funding. Allocations for the AGR program remains comparable to SAGE. Additionally, there is \$514,245 budgeted in board funds to support schools in the transition from SAGE to AGR.

School Nurses

Centralized school nursing includes a broad array of services for students, including administration and management of medicine, care for sick and injured students, vision screening, follow-up on immunization compliance, championing the defibrillator program, participation in the development of individual educational programs and other student programs, health and hygiene education, and assisting with managing chronic and communicable diseases.

This centrally funded budget provides \$2.0 million in board funds and is supplemented by Title I funding of \$3.5 million to support non–special education school nurse positions. Nurses funded by Title I manage care and provide services to support and sustain school attendance, reduce student absences and support increased academic achievement. One hundred fifteen schools will receive nursing services in 2017–18.

School Safety Operations

The \$13.7 million in the central school safety operations budget provides safety assistants for all traditional and instrumentality charter schools in 2017–18. The central budget funds 281.0 FTEs, which is an increase of 12.0 FTEs from 2016–17. While safety assistants are centrally funded, schools may budget additional safety in their budget. Additional funds are allocated to support limited-term employees for safety assistant positions and other duties such as bicycle patrols, monitors at schools that perform daily weapon scans and training for all safety division staff.

School Special Services

This central program provides special education classroom instruction and related services for traditional, instrumentality charter schools and alternative schools. Included in this program is classroom-based staff such as teachers, paraprofessional assistants and children's health assistants. It also includes support staff of speech pathologists, psychologists and social workers for each school. Funding of \$168.3 million in 2017–18 provides 2,320.91 FTEs.



Substitute Costs

In 2017–18, \$8.1 million is set aside to centrally fund most substitute teacher costs for traditional, alternative and instrumentality charter schools. Schools cover the cost of substitute teachers when staff is out for professional development. The district entered into a contract with a staffing firm that deploys substitute teachers when the need arises in order to ensure that all schools are fully staffed.

World Languages

Through a revision of the MPS graduation requirements, all MPS students will graduate with coursework that helps prepare them for postsecondary education. Beginning with the graduating class of 2021, students will graduate with two credits of world language. In order to ensure that high schools are adequately staffed, World Language teachers were centralized for the 2017–18 school year. A total of \$7.5 million is allocated for 80 teachers. Staffing will be centralized with the Department of Curriculum & Instruction, but schools have input and are able to choose which languages they would like to offer.

Interscholastic Athletics and Academics

The MPS Interscholastic Athletics program contributes to the athletic and academic development of each student while promoting sportsmanship, leadership and school unity. During the 2015–16 school year, 413 coaches mentored and trained 5,209 student athletes from 21 schools as they competed in 17 different sports.

Interscholastic Academics offers competitive opportunities in chess, debate and forensics. Student involvement enhances oral communication, competency, improved reading comprehension, more highly developed listening skills and stronger quantitative measures of academic achievement. These combined benefits contribute to students' critical thinking sets, thereby preparing them for success beyond high school. During the 2015–16 school year, 894 students representing 30 schools participated in chess, debate and forensics. A total of \$4.9 million is budgeted for school **Interscholastic Athletic and Academic** activities. These funds pay for coaches, equipment and contracted services such as officials, athletic trainers and uniform cleaning and repair.

This is inclusive of funding added to ensure that athletic programs are available to more students, including those ineligible for Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association competition due to age-eligibility criteria.

The school-based **Adaptive Athletics** program provides sports training and competition opportunities for students with disabilities. Slight modifications to traditional sports equipment and rules creates an inclusive environment that ensures success for all participants. Successful participation in Adaptive Athletics directly supports the classroom by promoting healthful physical activity, reinforces fine and gross motor skills, builds self-esteem and self-confidence, and teaches social skills through



cooperation with teachers and classmates alike. Students receive skill-based instruction at school, culminating with 27 athletic contests covering seven sports: Soccer, Bowling, Volleyball, Team Basketball, Basketball Skills, Bocce, and Track & Field. During the 2016–17 school year, more than 1,700 students were enrolled from 51 elementary, middle, and high schools. Many of these students participated in multiple events, resulting in over 5,000 individual experiences gained in the MPS Adaptive Athletics programs.

Instructional Resources

There is \$3.5 million budgeted in 2017–18 for textbook adoptions and instructional resources. This budget funds district-wide textbook and software adoptions as well as license renewals.

Learning Journeys

Learning Journeys are extensive, beyond-the-classroom learning experiences offered at no cost to all MPS students. The implementation of Learning Journeys into the MPS curriculum is a district initiative that connects classroom instruction to the greater community where students experience hands-on, relevant learning, engaging both their intellect and imagination. The strategically planned, integrated experiences enhance the curriculum rather than simply add on to the current curriculum. These tailored experiences are designed for *exposure* in grades K3–3, *experience* in grades 4–8 and *exploration* in grades 9–12.

• Kindergarten (K5) – "The Farm"

This Learning Journey takes students through Oak Ridge Farm for a hands-on experience with farm life. Students learn how the farm is important to them and their community and which goods and products come from the farm as well as how they are produced.

Grade 1 – "Snackin' on Plants"
 Students will be led through a firsthand experience with plants at Boerner Botanical Gardens where they will discover that the foods they eat every day are actually different parts of plants.

• Grade 3 – "Planet Earth"

Students travel back in time 4.6 billion years to when the Earth was beginning to form. This Learning Journey, which takes place at the Milwaukee Public Museum, extends students' knowledge of the solar system and history of the planet Earth.

• Grade 4 – "Where We Live"

Students become certified aquanauts during this Learning Journey as they learn about the Great Lakes. This Discovery World educator-led experience allows students to get up close and personal with animals of the Great Lakes and the role water plays in our communities.

• Grade 5 – "BizTown"

At Junior Achievement's BizTown, students experience life as an adult when they apply knowledge they have learned in class to their participation in an interactive, simulated town where they will take part in operating 15 businesses. This experience enhances understanding of free enterprise and increases knowledge of how the economy works.

Grade 8 – "Finance Park"

At Junior Achievement's Finance Park, students have the opportunity to learn financial literacy lessons on banking, budgeting, credit, taxes and careers. Students are assigned a life scenario and then must manage their finances and construct a workable household budget.

Each Learning Journey is an investment of approximately \$55,000 per grade level per year. This includes transportation, curriculum materials and admission fees. All funding for Learning Journeys is through central services so schools are not responsible for the cost.

Non-Instrumentality Charter, Contracted Schools and Programs

Non-Instrumentality Charter Schools

By administrative policy, non-instrumentality charter schools receive the same per-pupil funding amount that the state determines for charter schools contracting through the University of Wisconsin–Milwaukee, Milwaukee Area Technical College and the City of Milwaukee.

The total amount of instructional and non-instructional support for 2017–18 is budgeted at \$8,405 per student. The per-pupil allocation is established in the state budget. Other funding is contingent upon various contractual provisions. Overall funding for non-instrumentality charter schools is \$63.4 million in 2017–18 and projected enrollment in non-instrumentality charter schools is expected to be 7,383 students in September 2017.

MPS Alternative Schools and Programs

MPS alternative schools for at-risk students include various educational programs for MPS students. Funding varies by program. Allocations are different from regular MPS schools because of the variability of program enrollments throughout the year, resulting in different per-pupil rates. Total funding for these programs is \$9.3 million for 2017–18. For a description of these schools and programs, see the "Types of Schools" section earlier in the document; their allocations are listed below:

• Alternative Schools – Groppi, Project STAY and Transition High School are projected to enroll 250 students each at any given point in the school year. Their allocation is based off a formula that allocates a set amount for staff, contracted services and a dollar amount per student for supplies and other wages. The allocation is set with the fluctuating nature of enrollment at the schools. These three schools receive the same centralized support as other traditional MPS schools. The total allocation for these three schools is \$3.1 million

- South and Vincent Acceleration Alternative sites at South and Vincent are expected to enroll 100 students each. These schools each receive an allocation of three regular education teachers, a special education teacher and a teacher leader, plus additional funding for contract services and supplies. Total funding for each of these two schools is \$814,030
- Home and Hospital Allocation of \$514,245 for students unable to be at a school site
- Milwaukee County Collaborative Allocation of \$311,783 for programs for incarcerated youth
- Pregnant and Parenting Youth Allocation of \$748,869 for pregnant students and new mothers and fathers
- School-to-Work Transition Allocation of \$3.0 million for on-the-job training and vocational programs for students with special needs.

Partnership Schools

As described earlier, partnership schools are operated by external agencies that contract with MPS. Per-pupil funding for most partnership schools decreased from \$9,327 in 2016–17 to \$9,120.72 in 2017–18. Chart 3.50 shows the detailed calculation for the partnership per pupil:

Note: Partnership schools pay an administrative fee of an amount written into their contract to MPS to contribute toward costs of oversight for their services.

These programs, as appropriate, receive a special education allocation for the non-grant-funded, school-based classroom staff for students with special education needs as well as supportive service staff (speech, diagnostic, psychological and social work services). At-risk partnership sites are budgeted at \$8.1 million in 2017–18. Grant funds for special education programs provide an additional \$1.9 million to serve students with severe emotional behavioral disability.

Other Centrally Allocated Funds

Allied Health

This program provides district-wide special education related services. It funds psychologists, social workers, occupational therapists, physical therapists and nurses. Funding in 2017–18 is \$5.4 million.

Common School Fund

The common school fund provides school library resources such as newspapers, periodicals, library automation software and related software components or licenses. Revenue for 2017–18, which is finalized in January of the school year, is estimated at \$5.0 million. Schools are given an allocation of, and are required to budget, \$20 per pupil as part of their board allocation, which accounts for \$1.3 million in 2017–18. The remaining \$3.7 million will be spent through a central budget for district-wide library uses.

School Special Funds

For 2017–18, the school special funds budget is \$39.9 million. The largest portion of the budget supports open enrollment payments of \$36.0 million to other districts. There are 5,250 students that participate in the open enrollment program. The fund will also include translation services and funding for other district initiatives, including funding for instructional program support, attendance and trauma-informed care. Trauma-informed care training will inform all MPS staff members on how trauma manifests in a school setting, prevention and intervention options, the importance of a trauma-informed perspective and vicarious trauma.

Summer School

Board funding totals \$5.6 million, which is a \$1.6 million increase from 2016–17 due to program expansion. This includes an extended school year program for students with special education needs that is anticipated to enroll 640 students and will receive an allocation of \$1.8 million. Other programs include the following:

- A five-week high school summer session at one site accommodating about 900 ninth through twelfth grade students
- A five-week eighth grade summer program at one site serving about 250 students who need additional academic preparation to be promoted to ninth grade
- J-Term is a four week session held in June for students in grades 6-12. Students will be able to complete or take condensed course(s), participate in internship opportunities, build proficiency in key skill areas and get ahead or stay on track for graduation.

The summer school budget also includes funding for the "Freshman Bridge" program that will provide all incoming ninth graders with early opportunities to meet ninth grade teachers, connect to upperclassmen, identify extracurricular areas of interest and have opportunities to ask questions that help freshmen navigate their first year with information and skills that can lead to a better outcome. The summer of 2016 was the first year in which all high schools participated in the program, and 6,349 students were served. A new program for middle school students will allow incoming sixth graders opportunities to form a realistic expectation of what middle school will be like, build a sense of community, explore extracurricular activities and learn how middle school is different than elementary school.

Summer Wraparound Sessions

Funding from the Extension Fund totals \$2.8 million in 2017–18. Programs include the following:

- Multi-faceted summer sessions at 18 elementary or K–8 sites providing a broad spectrum of opportunities in enrichment and developmental academics for 4,000 K–8 students. Literacy and math enrichment opportunities will be offered to identify and meet individual student needs.
- Be the Change, a program that is designed to improve outcomes among targeted high school students in the areas of academics, leadership and life skills. The program is a collaboration among MPS, the City of Milwaukee and supports the My Brother's Keeper initiative.



- Summer Adventure field trips offer hands-on experiences that focus on Wisconsin's unique heritage, the natural environment, insects, life cycles and farm life.
- MPS provides healthy meals for students participating in the Summer Academy program.

Community Learning Centers

In 2017–18, MPS will partner with nine community-based agencies to facilitate 21st-century Community Learning Centers (CLCs) in 49 MPS schools. This is the same number of CLCs as 2016–17. These essential after-school programs engage young minds through tutoring, recreation and enrichment activities that complement and reinforce school-day curricula. Throughout the year, students participate in programs focused on reading, math, science, art, music, technology, recreation, character education, drug awareness and violence prevention. Families of participating students also receive educational assistance, including literacy training and help with job skills. In the 2016–17 school year, 49 CLC sites were open for a minimum of 30 weeks, serving 10,408 students at 37 elementary/K–8 schools and 12 middle and high schools. Funding of \$2.7 million is received as a federal grant for 47 schools with CLCs. Board funds of \$3.0 million in the School Operations and Extension funds augment the reduction in federal grant allocations and support summer CLC operations.

Advanced Academic Programs

Advanced Academic Programs supports the expansion of the Advanced Placement, International Baccalaureate and world languages programs in MPS. Through a revision of the MPS graduation requirements, all MPS students will graduate with coursework that helps prepare them for postsecondary education. Beginning with the graduating class of 2021, students will graduate with 2 credits of world language and college and career readiness coursework such as AP, IB, and/or career and technical education courses. In 2017–18, 15,000 students are expected to be supported in world languages through instruction, materials and resources, curriculum support, and summer support courses. With the centralization of world language teachers at high schools, the Department of Curriculum & Instruction will provide access to online curriculum and resources to provide all schools with support for world languages. More than 4,000 students are expected to participate in AP or IB examinations in May 2018.

The SpringBoard program is funded through the Advanced Academic Programs budget. SpringBoard is the foundational component for the College Board's College Readiness System, offering a proven pre-Advanced Placement (AP) program that increases participation and prepares a more diverse field of students for success in AP, college and beyond. Based on College Board Standards for College Success and aligned to the Common Core

State Standards, SpringBoard offers the only integrated college-readiness program that includes a rigorous curriculum, formative assessments and sustainable professional development. Ten schools are implementing the SpringBoard program in 2017–18 with 8,000 students expected to be served.

Credit Recovery

A budget of \$1.5 million is set aside for additional programs that support student college and career readiness. The budget also provides support for these options:

- General Education Diploma (GED) allows authorized school districts to use the GED test battery to
 measure proficiency in lieu of high school credits for students enrolled in an alternative education
 program. Students receive instruction that prepares them for successful completion of standardized GED
 content exams to earn a regular high school diploma. Instruction is also provided in the area of
 employability skills and financial literacy. Content area preparation is delivered through a blended model
 of online curriculum with differentiated support from licensed teachers based on results from approved
 GED practice tests. A student who passes the GED tests and completes the additional requirements is
 entitled to the traditional high school diploma. Students participating in this program must be at least 17
 years of age, one year behind their ninth grade class in credits earned and be able to demonstrate an
 ability to read at or above the ninth grade level.
- **Competency Based Curriculum** is an option for students who do not meet the eligibility requirements for GEDO #2. This approach is personalized, offering high school students an opportunity to demonstrate proficiency through a path that is specific to individual student needs. Transcripts are reviewed to determine which academic requirements have previously been met. Students are required to have an 85% attendance rate and meet a minimum of 15 hours of face-to-face instructions per week. The goal is for a student to graduate with a traditional high school diploma.
- <u>Edgenuity</u> uses an online curriculum that aligns to MPS expectations regarding curriculum and rigor. The Edgenuity program provides individually paced lessons for which students can "test out" by demonstrating mastery. Students can work on Edgenuity coursework outside school but are required to attend school for blended learning support. Schools offer students to take two courses at a time (up to one full credit) and allow students to take additional courses if time allows. Students, parents and teachers can monitor their progress toward completion using the resource tools available online. When courses are completed, grades are updated to reflect student proficiency. Most MPS high schools offer this program to assist students with on-time graduation.

Other Central School Programs

- Assessments and Interventions The district budgeted \$2.1 million, plus an additional \$800,000 in Title I funds for the costs of contracts for various student assessments and supports, such as the following:
 - CogAT The district universally screens all students in second grade for gifted and talented identification as part of Response to Intervention. Directions are available in Spanish or can be translated into another language. CogAT is a norm-referenced assessment that measures "learned reasoning abilities" through the following:
 - o Verbal Battery: assesses ability to use search, retrieval and comparison processes
 - o Quantitative Battery: assesses ability to reason about patterns and relationships
 - Nonverbal Battery: assesses ability to reason with novel questions that use spatial and figural content

- STAR STAR is the district's universal screener and progress monitoring assessment used to assess students in grades K–12 three times per year in both reading and math. STAR Early Literacy Spanish, STAR Reading Spanish and STAR Math Spanish are also available. These tests were normed during 2015–16. Accommodations for ELLs are available.
- Odyssey Compass Learning Odyssey assignments in both math and reading are customized for each individual student based on his or her STAR score. Students are able to work independently to practice on specific areas that are needed to reach their targeted goals.
- ACT Reporting Grades 9 and 10 take the ACT Aspire exam, which measures college and career-readiness skills and knowledge and provides a predicted ACT score range. The ACT, which is the national college admissions exam, is taken by all students in grade 11. Through the exam the district gains valuable information about what students have learned in high school courses, academic achievement and college-readiness levels. The ACT is the state accountability test for grade 11.
- PSAT All eleventh graders and select tenth graders take the PSAT. Scores on the PSAT in grades 10 and 11 are used to qualify students for scholarships, including National Merit Scholarships. The test results match students to potential Advanced Placement courses.
- PALS Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening, which is a screening tool for developmental milestones in literacy acquisition for students in K4 through second grade.
- Equity Access Inclusion \$477,705 is budgeted to support the "My Brother's Keeper" initiative by collaborating with branches of government, local businesses and community organizations to increase the number of males of color who are succeeding academically and socially. Efforts include ensuring that culturally responsive teaching practices are in place at all schools, enhancing the district vision for student participation in a wide range of after-school activities and supporting trauma-informed care.
- Wraparound Services These services include social, emotional, health, enrichment and other critical services provided beyond the classroom to help students and families achieve academic and personal success. MPS departments and community organizations provide services to families in the following areas: whole child supports to address academic concerns, physical health supports, mental health activities, extended learning opportunities, and college and career supports.
- **College Access Centers** The College Access Centers provide students and families with direct services that are easily accessible via public transportation and close to resources that families typically frequent, such as grocery stores and other retail ventures. These community-based locations support the college access outreach efforts of Milwaukee Public Schools and engage families in the support and reinforcement of college attendance for Milwaukee students in centers focused on college attainment. A total of \$1.5 million is budgeted for College Access Centers, plus GE grant funds that will also support the expansion of programming to support school-based centers at all traditional high schools
- Newcomer Centers Starting in 2017–18, the International Newcomer Center, which historically served refugee students in grades 4 through 8, was expanded to include high school students at South Division. In this program, students learn academic content while simultaneously learning English. Students in the Newcomer Center are taught using a method called "sheltered instruction." This teaching method involves using instructional scaffolding (an instructional technique in which the teacher builds on students' experiences and knowledge as they are learning new skills), visuals such as picture dictionaries and both content and language objectives. Students participate in Learning Journeys and other opportunities to enhance their academic achievement.
- MPS Drive MPS Drive, provides free driver's education to any Milwaukee Public Schools student between the ages of 15½ and 17¾. This unprecedented initiative is designed to eliminate potential barriers

preventing a young person from obtaining a driver's license and works to close the gap between

Milwaukee youth and their suburban counterparts as it relates to possession of a driver's license. Uniquely, the program also contains a restorative track so that young people with suspended driving privileges can restore their ability to obtain a driver's license prior to participating in driver education classes. Contracted services include the certified driving school, program evaluation, a partnership with the Center for Driver's License Recovery and



Employability to reinstate driving eligibility for students who have suspended driving privileges, and the coordination of community service hours for students working to regain driving eligibility. A total of \$646,105 is budgeted to support the program.

Student Engagement

To support the cultures and climates where the academic needs of students can be met, the Superintendent Student Advisory Council was established. The advisory council provides the unique opportunity in which student voices will not only be heard but included in decision making. Students take ownership of their education while being afforded the opportunity to gain knowledge and experience in local-level policy making. The advisory council also provides a space for the development of leadership and communication skills for students who are not considered "traditional leaders." Bringing guest speakers to speak to the council, meeting private and public sector executives, college and career excursions and cultural enrichment activities will allow the council to be a robust student association. The Superintendent Student Advisory Council seeks to use these opportunities toward the advancement of the following goals:

- Student representation from each high school in the district
- Inclusion of students in the decision-making process of the Milwaukee Board of School Directors

Family and Community Engagement

Families play a vital role in the education of their children. Milwaukee Public Schools works with families and staff

to ensure that they have the tools needed to be equal partners in supporting student achievement and school improvement. When families and schools work together, students are more successful, and the entire community benefits.

MPS is committed to increasing its family and community engagement efforts. We know that a school with involved families is more likely to have high levels of trust and be able to make improvements in academics. To increase engagement, we must use national best practices, research and data to shift the paradigm of our system. The Family & Community Engagement team has created a playbook for use across the district, an online resource that is frequently updated with new information, tools, templates and strategies for use within schools.

The new MPS engagement framework builds from well-established practices across the country, including the community schools model, collective



impact theory and the dual capacity-building framework. Starting from a strengths-based perspective for both families and staff, MPS will work to build three core values at all schools within the district:

- 1. **Shared Leadership** MPS provides avenues for family leadership and increases two-way communication and involvement opportunities for families.
- 2. Equity MPS meets families where they are and accesses community assets to equip families and staff with the tools needed to partner in supporting student success.
- 3. **Cultural Relevance** MPS creates a welcoming environment that recognizes the backgrounds, knowledge and experience of all families.

Shared leadership is built at the school level through parent groups and School Governance Councils that liaise at the district level to the family District Advisory Council. A new opportunity for shared leadership is the quarterly MPS Family Forums. These are full-day events that encourage knowledge exchange, discussion and collaboration between staff and families. These events are planned in partnership between district staff and family leaders and will have a variety of workshops geared toward both families and staff. Additionally, each will feature an opportunity for discussion with the superintendent on current issues facing MPS.

Equity is built at our schools by meeting families where they are and providing the tools necessary to partner to support student success. To do this, MPS launched a Family Empowerment University (FEU) in fall 2016. The FEU features a course catalog of different institutes, workshops and resources that families and staff can access to



build their capacity to work together for student success. Business and community partners as well as families will lead these learning opportunities at local schools.

Cultural relevance is critical if MPS is to build trust with families and communities. We must ensure a welcoming, customerfocused environment at all of our schools. Every family of an MPS student should feel they belong in that school. To create that sense of belonging, MPS Family Cafés are being created to provide an area for families to connect with each other, to receive referrals from MPS resource libraries, and to support their student's progress.

Creating this safe space in every school is essential, but we must also reach out into the community and ensure that all families have access to MPS. Therefore, MPS is establishing four regional Community Information and Enrollment Centers that will serve as customer service centers for families and community members to interact with MPS closer to home. Any family currently connected to MPS or interested in learning more will be able to come into the centers and receive a guided virtual enrollment tour that explains the various options within MPS schools and helps families through the process of selecting the best-fit school for their student. Additionally, these centers will offer Lau Compliance Testing, Child Find services, family dispute resolution processing, recreation activity sign-up, Parent Portal enrollment and navigation assistance, and much more.

All MPS schools have a parent coordinator to facilitate these activities and build the core values. To increase their capacity, seven new family and community engagement associate positions were created within the 2016–17 budget. These associates serve as backbone support for selected family-focused initiatives and work to implement those initiatives in schools through coaching of parent coordinators and school leaders. Through this work, the

associates will connect business and community partners to our schools and help to facilitate place-based collective impact by supporting schools in aligning all partners to the school improvement plan.

Focusing on shared leadership, equity and cultural relevance in all of our schools lays the groundwork for MPS schools to increase family and community engagement. Additionally, the added capacity of family and community engagement associates to align partners with a school improvement plan moves all of our schools closer to implementation of the community schools model by fostering collective impact. Through a partnership with United Way of Greater Milwaukee & Waukesha County, six MPS schools are able to operate at the highest level of family and community engagement by joining the Milwaukee Community Schools Partnership. This collective strategy employs a full-time community school coordinator at each school to work with numerous partners to transform schools into a place where students, families, staff and the surrounding community can work together to ensure that every student is successful.



Alumni Engagement

Get plugged in!



Alumni of Milwaukee Public Schools are uniquely positioned to partner with the district to effect change in student achievement, in the engagement of students and families, and for the effective and efficient operations of our schools and the district.

We have placed a renewed emphasis on intentional and strategic alumni engagement to help us accomplish our goals. In 2015–16, that process began by inventorying our alumni assets and by reenergizing our alumni base by hosting the first-ever MPS All-Alumni Reunion.

In 2017–18, the district will continue its efforts to strategically engage and support alumni by ensuring that all alumni groups are robust and fully supported by the district, by creating opportunities to bring additional alumni into positions of leadership within the district and providing opportunities for alumni to participate in the success of the district's initiatives. The "MPS Alumni Hub" serves as a central website for alumni to find ways to engage with MPS as well as their alma mater.

Volunteers

Volunteers play a large role in the success of MPS schools and initiatives. Annually, over 3,000 volunteers work in schools, classrooms and district-wide to help the district meet its goals. MPS volunteers provide tutoring, literacy skills, teacher assistance and a helping hand in a variety of settings and at events such as our Biennial Music Festival and STEM Fair.

For 2017–18, MPS will continue to work to improve the efficiency of our volunteer program while working to ensure that our volunteers have a positive, rewarding experience in our schools. The overall volunteer application and process to become a volunteer is currently under review with the overall goal being to move to a system that will make becoming a volunteer in MPS easier and more user friendly. Additionally, systems will be put into place to better track volunteer data to allow us to be more strategic with our volunteer activities while also increasing community outreach to increase the number of volunteers in MPS.

- Column 5: Total ESL Funding is based on projected number of staff allocated on the basis of languageproficiency levels of the students at the school.

Column 16:	Special Needs Fund – The Special Needs Fund is a resource available to all schools needing assistance with the necessary resources to implement a student's IEP.
Column 17:	Transition Coordinators – Transition coordinators work with students with disabilities ages 14 to 21 to create postsecondary plans for college and career.
Column 18:	Speech/Language – Speech-language pathologists provide prevention, assessment and remediation services for students who exhibit difficulties in the areas of language, speech, voice and fluency. These services are designed to help children meet their educational goals.
Column 19:	Psychologist – Psychologists perform specialized psychological work in an educational setting to enable students to achieve optimal learning.
Columns 20-21:	School Social Work – School social workers help parents, students and school staff identify needs that interfere with learning and work with students to get the services they need.
Columns 22-25:	Centralized Support – Staff members in these columns include program support teachers, special education supervisors and nurse associates. These positions are funded centrally but work at school locations.

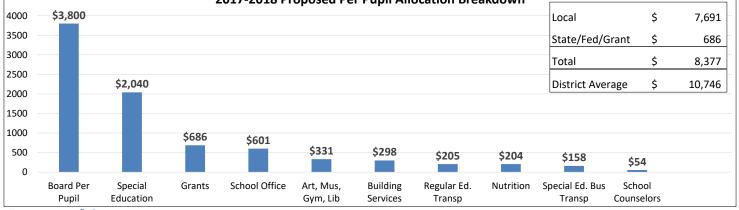

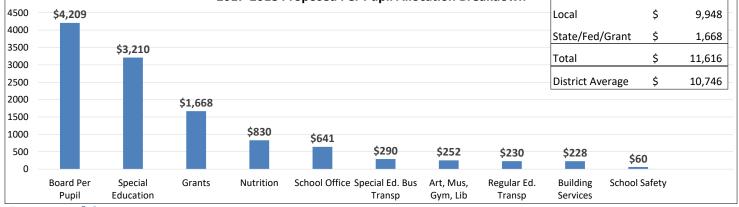

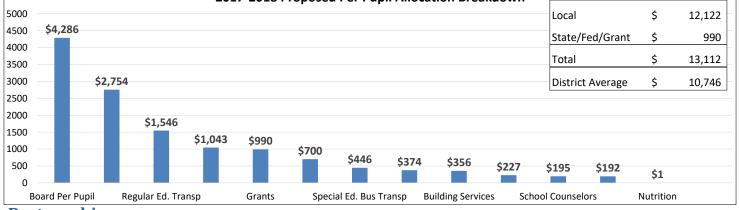

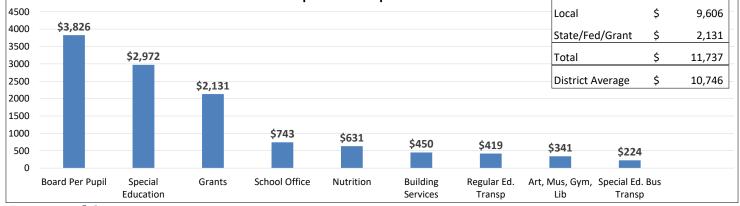

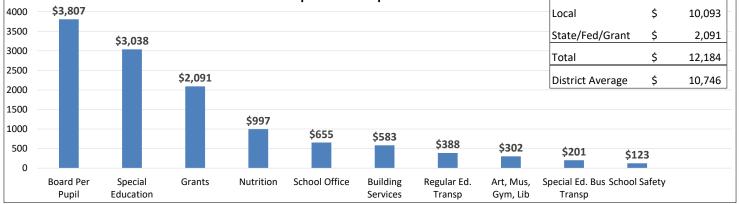

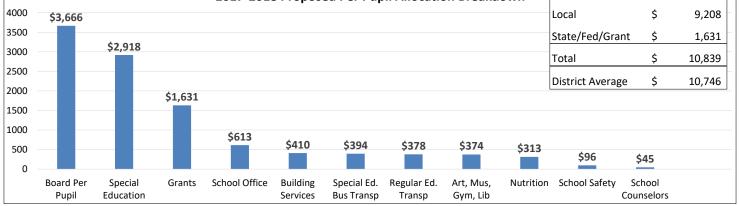

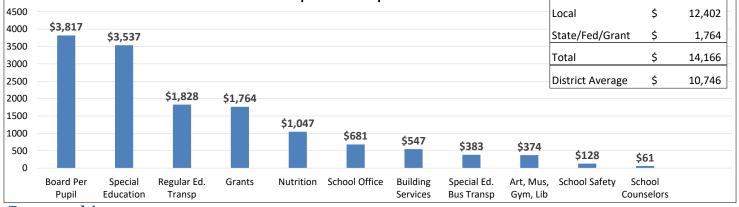

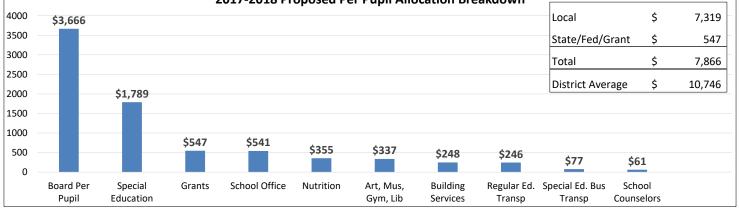

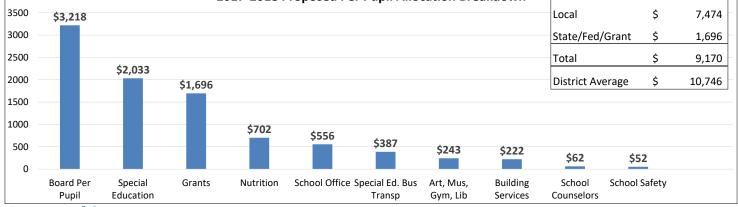

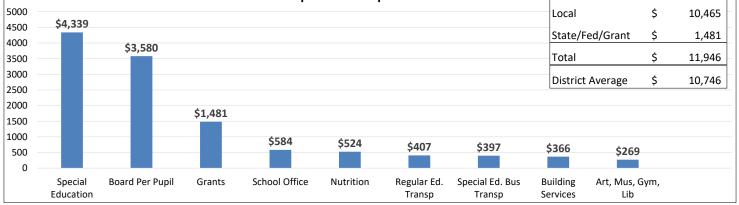

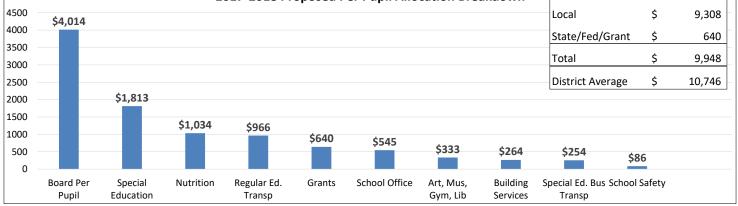

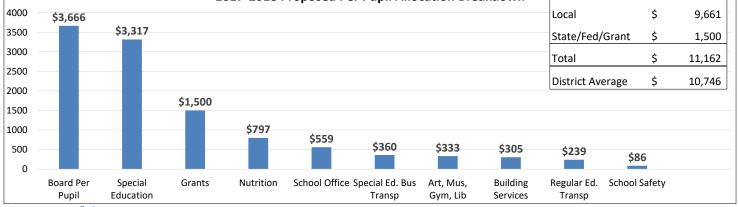

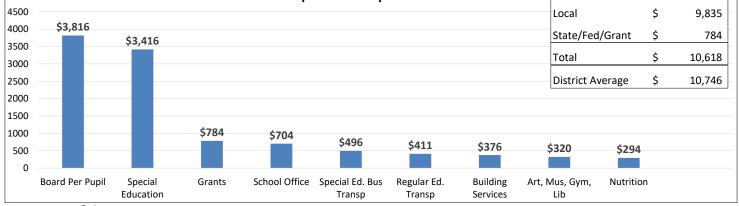

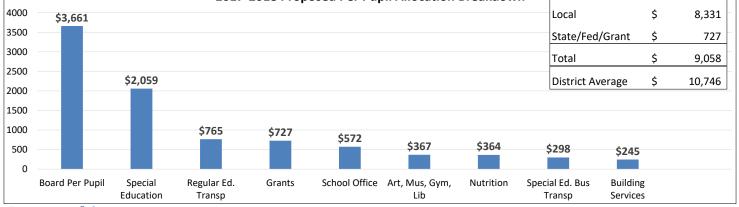

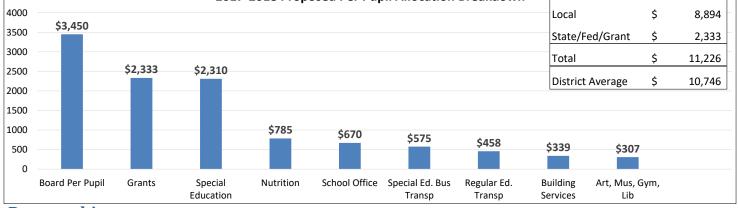

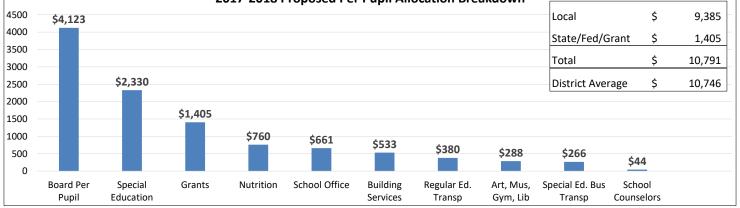

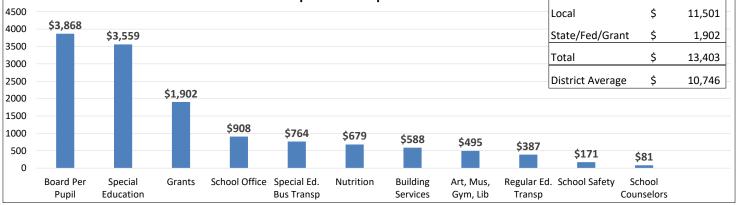

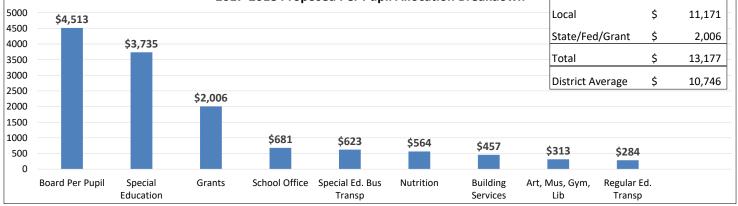

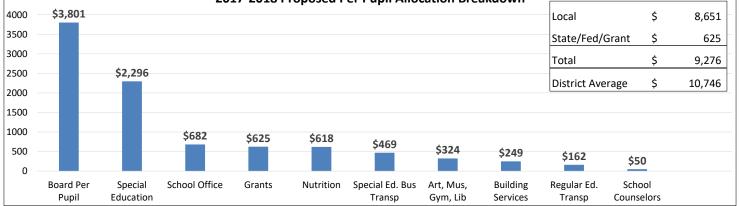

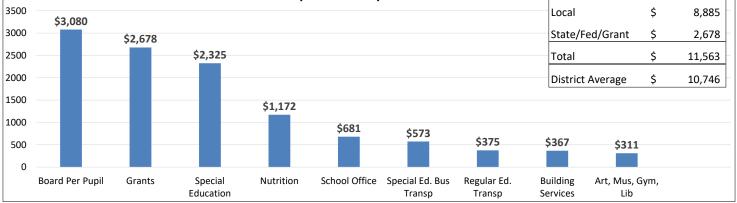

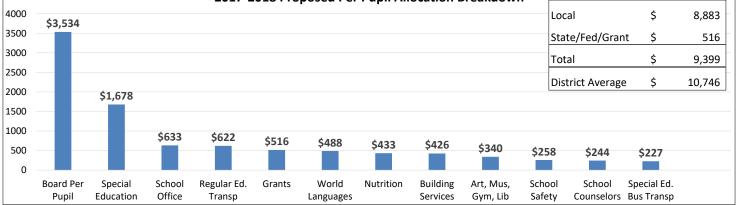

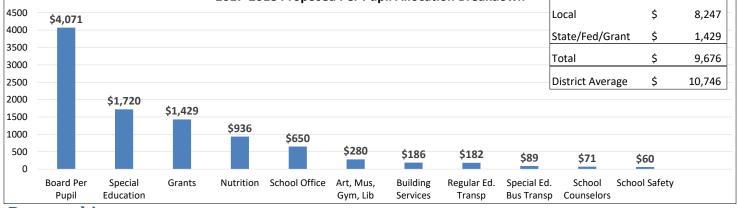

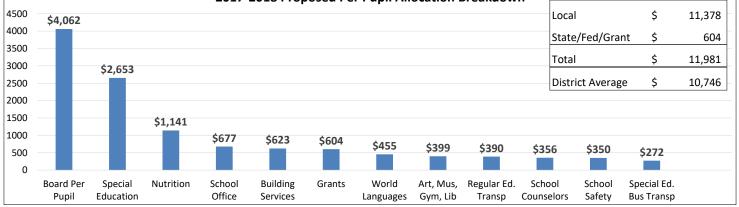

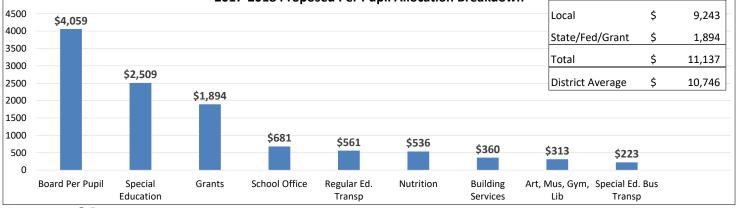

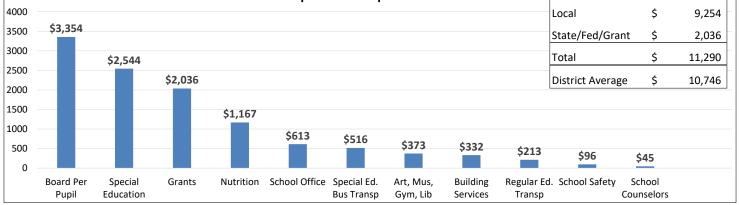

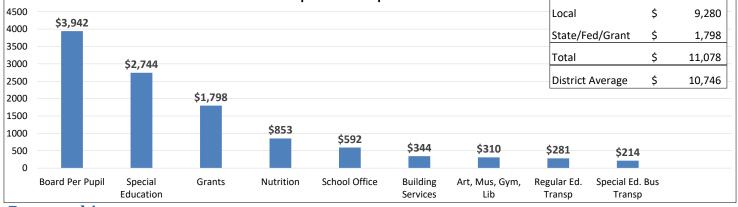
